- 2024 Fall. **Graduate Seminar. Queerness and Disability in Latin American Literature & Culture, 1880-1930**
With the rise of Latin American modernity, LGBTQ and crip populations were portrayed in literature, medical science, and visual culture as deviant. The discursive mechanisms to produce truths about bodies as normative or perverse, real or unreal, fit or disabled not only achieved authority in medicine, but also in numerous platforms where ableist heteronormativity was sedimented as a hegemonic way of life. Literature, theater, museums, the modern press, and the visual arts became semiotic territories for the production of racial, gender, sex, and psychophysical difference. But queer/crip/trans* and critical race theory have offered tools to critique the sexual hegemony and ableism of such patriarchal-colonial mindset. This graduate course introduces students to such debates in new Latin American critical studies, with a global perspective. Focusing on the cultural production of modern Latin America and the Caribbean, students will investigate and critique the somatic constructions of the so-called “deviant” in excerpts from novels, plays, chronicles, early films, and clinical studies. Texts by José Tomás de Cuéllar, Luis Montané Dardé, Leonidio Ribeiro, Eduardo Castrejón, Adolfo Caminha, Augusto D’Halmar, Rómulo Gallegos, José González Castillo, Elías Castelnuovo, Teresa de La Parra, Bernardo Arias Trujillo, Francisco de Veyga, among others. Non-Latin American authors include Magnus Hirschfeld, Richard Von Krafft-Ebing, Sigmund Freud, Havelock Ellis, Jean-Martin Charcot, among others. The course will be taught in Spanish and English.

- 2024 Fall. **Graduate/Undergraduate Seminar. Sex, Crime & Horror in Argentine Literature and the Visual Arts**

This course examines a historical trajectory of Argentine literature, cinema, and the visual arts through the study of three thematic currents that significantly influenced Argentina’s cultural and socio-political experience with nation-building, modernization, and democracy: sex, crime, and horror. The primary objective of the course is to foster a critical exploration of how foundational works of Romanticism and Realism in the Río de la Plata, the Noir genre, and the Gothic tradition accounted for decisive changes in the social fabric of the country. Students will assess the role of sexuality, crime, and horror stories in the representation of momentous events in Argentine

history, spanning from the revolutionary era in the nineteenth century to the contemporary period. Topics include the Wars of Independence, *gaucho* literature, indigenous resistance, the great transatlantic migration, the rise of the middle classes, Peronismo, youth culture, military dictatorships, human rights violations, LGBT movements, and economic precarity in neoliberal times. Works by Esteban Echeverría, Domingo Faustino Sarmiento, Juana Manuela Gorriti, José Hernández, Lucio V. and Eduarda Mansilla, Leopoldo Lugones, Roberto Arlt, Jorge Luis Borges, Juan José Saer, Alejandra Pizarnik, Juan Gelman, Silvina Ocampo, Rodolfo Walsh, Manuel Puig, Ricardo Piglia, Mariana Enríquez, María Luisa Bemberg, Luis Puenzo, Santiago Mitre, among others. 2023 **Winter. Graduate Seminar. América Latina LGBTQ**

Este curso es un recorrido por escenas literarias latinoamericanas sobre la diversidad sexo-genérica. Se involucra con pequeños recortes impresos donde la heteronormatividad es puesta en cuestión como única forma posible de vínculo erótico- afectivo como así también organización socio-política. Esta selección de escenas permite ver la yuxtaposición e insistencia de discursos en torno al género y el sexo que formaron un imaginario hetero-sexista y colonial, pero que también sembraron las pautas de resistencia y descentramiento de la matriz del poder disciplinario/biopolítico de los cuerpos. Textos literarios de Reinaldo Arenas, Pedro Lemebel, Néstor Perlongher, Luis Zapata, Sylvia Molloy, Camila Sosa Villada, Gabriela Cabezón Cámara, entre otros.

2023 **Winter. Undergraduate Course. Literature and Social Change in Spanish America**

This course offers a detailed study of key moments and texts in Spanish American culture from the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, focusing on such topics as the creation of new nations, *indigenismo*, Caribbean anti-slavery literature, and the Mexican and Cuban Revolutions. Students will examine films, novels, short stories, manifestos, letters, and biographies about iconic figures, including Simón Bolívar, Juan Manuel de Rosas, Facundo Quiroga, Pancho Villa and Emiliano Zapata, Frida Kahlo, Eva Perón, Ernesto ‘Che’ Guevara, and The Mothers of Plaza de Mayo.

2023 **Winter. Undergraduate Course. A Brief History of Love in the Western World**

This course examines crucial turning points in the Hispanic intellectual tradition on the subject of love. Through an examination of philosophical, medical, theological, and literary texts about love from the Medieval period to the present, we will discuss how some of the most outstanding writers of the Hispanic world conceived of the idea of love. How did notions of class, race, gender, and sexuality play into the concept of love in different historical periods? How are these notions reflected – or not – in our present understandings of love? The point of revisiting pivotal moments in Hispanic literary history is to investigate how diverse modes of aesthetic renditions of affective relationships are co-dependent with the social, economic, and political contexts that shape the meanings of love. Students will develop fundamental skills of university education – to conduct research, produce a well-written academic essay, communicate ideas effectively, and participate in constructive classroom discussions. Texts by Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz, Félix Lope de Vega, Pedro Calderón de La Barca, Luis de

Góngora, Emilia Pardo Bazán, Juana Manuela Gorriti, Gabriela Mistral, Teresa de la Parra, Gabriela Cabezón Cámara, among others.

- 2021 Fall. **Graduate Seminar. Queer Spectacles in Fin-de-Siècle Latin America**
This graduate-level course introduces students to critical debates concerned with understanding the meaning and applications of queerness. The seminar discusses a range of approaches to counter-sexual formations, racial imaginaries, and political mobilizations. Focusing on the cultural production of fin-de-siècle Latin America and the Caribbean, the course examines the somatic constructions of the «perverse» in diverse semiotic experiments, including novels, plays, *crónicas*, and clinical studies.

This undergraduate course introduces students to the literary history of transgenderism in the Latin American long fin-de-siècle (1890-1930), with particular attention to *modernista* and *avant-garde* cultural productions. We explore how queer women and early forms of transmasculinities, pejoratively called *marimachos* in the vernacular culture, came to embody dissident identities that disputed gender binaries and late nineteenth-century concepts of womanhood, decorum, and maternity.
